Abstract

Previous research has successfully identified different administrative, political and context-related factors that enable international bureaucracies to wield influence on the development and implementation of public policies. However, integrative approaches that allow for a comparative analysis of several explanatory factors under a common theoretical framework are rare. Against this background, the panel aims to contribute to the current debate about the policy influence of international bureaucracies. It invites conceptual and empirical papers on the role of international bureaucracies in the provision of public policy that may come from a variety of disciplines.
