UCLouvain FUCaM Mons

UCLouvain FUCaM Mons has trained generations of political scientists, communication specialists, economists and managers in the heart of Hainaut

UCLouvain FUCaM Mons is one of the campuses of UCLouvain, and home to two faculties: the Faculty of Economic, Social, Political and Communication Sciences (ESPO) and the Louvain School of Management (LSM). They offer highly ranked courses in public administration, information and communication, management sciences and engineering, international relations, social sciences and political science.

There is also a strong tradition of research in political science in the Institute of Political Science Louvain-Europe (ISPOLE) based in Louvain-la-Neuve and Mons.

ISPOLE hosts six research centres: CECRI – Centre for International Crisis and Conflict Studies, CEE – Centre for European Studies, CESPOL – Centre for political science and comparative politics, CMAP – Montesquieu Centre for Public Policy Studies – Political and Administrative section, DVLP – Centre of development studies, and Globalit, a research centre that focuses on how globalisation affects literature and, more broadly, the cultural industry.

Education

The university welcomes more than 30,000 students in seven locations across Brussels and Wallonia. UCLouvain offers courses in all disciplines, from bachelor's degree to doctoral degree level, as well as many lifelong learning programmes. It is also a pioneer in the creation of massive open online courses (MOOCs), and the first French-speaking university in Europe to offer online courses on the edX platform.

The MOOC *Discover political science / Découvrir la science politique* was designed, developed and shot mainly in Mons.

The Mons campus is at the forefront of the renewal of teaching practices, with several highly connected rooms – where some of our Joint Sessions Workshops will take place – and student labs.

Research

As a research university, UCLouvain fosters an international community based on recognition of the

Heritage

The ECPR is an independent, scholarly association that supports and encourages the training, research and cross-national co-operation of political scientists through Europe and the world

Membership

ECPR membership is institutional and currently comprises nearly 350 universities concerned with the teaching and research of political science. Membership is paid by the university, but it is the individuals within it who receive the benefit; from Master's and PhD students, through to the most senior professor.

ECPR events

General Conference

Next event 4 – 7 September, University of Wrocław

The ECPR General Conference is the largest annual gathering of political scientists in Europe, regularly bringing together some 2,000 scholars from across the world.

This year's academic programme features 68 Sections and around 500 Panels covering the full spectrum of political science and international relations, as well as an engaging Plenary programme of topical and high-profile lectures and Roundtables.

Joint Sessions of Workshops

Next event 14 – 17 April, Sciences Po Toulouse

Unique in format and considered the highlight of the annual international political science calendar, the Joint Sessions of Workshops have been held in a different European city every spring since 1973. The Joint Sessions remain extremely competitive, with a strict limit of

15–20 participants per Workshop, all of whom are researching in that particular field. Participants present a Paper which is then discussed in detail by the full group, providing unrivalled opportunity for feedback and development of research.

Methods School

Next event 26 July – 9 August, Central European University, Budapest

ECPR believes that good research requires solid methodology. Our biannual Methods School offers training across all methodologies, and caters to the needs of macro- and micro-level research. The courses, which can be followed on their own or combined over one or more events, cover quantitative and qualitative designs as well as positivist and interpretative perspectives.

The Winter School in Methods and Techniques takes place around February/March each year; the Summer School runs July–August. Combining the Summer and Winter Schools, you can follow training tracks to create a bespoke package.

Funding

To encourage participation in ECPR events, every year we award around 200 grants to scholars from full-member institutions. Grants are a key membership benefit, but the number for each event is capped, so applying does not guarantee success. Applicants are limited to one ECPR Grant/Registration Refund in any two-year period.

ECPR grants contribute towards attendance and are paid after the event. We also offer funding to our Standing Groups, either as 'seed money' to help start up a new group, or to support the organisation of a summer school. See the Funding tab of our website to find out more.

MyECPR

Staff and students at member institutions are encouraged to set up a MyECPR account, through which you can register for events, and keep track of Section, Workshop, Panel and Paper submissions, and funding applications. You can also make contact with other scholars who share your research interests, and subscribe to relevant news bulletins.

Publications

Journals and book series

ECPR co-publishes four leading journals: *European Political Science*, *European Journal of Political Research*, *European Political Science Review* and the *European Journal of International Relations*. It also publishes the high-profile Comparative Politics book series, with Oxford University Press.

Last year saw the launch of a brand-new Open Access journal, *Political Research Exchange*, published in partnership with Taylor & Francis.



ECPR Press

In 2005 the ECPR launched its own imprint: ECPR Press. The Press publishes high-quality Monographs and collections of Essays, along with a small selection of Classics that have made a significant contribution to political studies scholarship.

Now published in partnership with Rowman & Littlefield International, the imprint also includes a highly respected series of multi-authored, edited volumes, *Studies in European Political Science*, many of which have developed from Workshops and Panels at ECPR events.

Standing Groups and Research Networks

ECPR Standing Groups and Research Networks are formalised groups of researchers that operate with the institutional support of the ECPR. Reflecting the breadth of the discipline, there are currently over 50 groups covering all sub-fields of political science and international relations. Anyone with an interest in that field can join a Group or Network and instantly connect with scholars working in their area through regular mailings, organisation of Sections, Panels or Workshops at ECPR events, annual meetings or even their own international conferences and summer schools.

Prizes

ECPR awards ten prizes each year.

These recognise achievement at all stages of a scholar's career, including the annual Jean Blondel PhD Prize for the best thesis by a scholar at a member institution, and the biennial Lifetime Achievement Award, for a scholar who has made an outstanding contribution to the discipline.

Dynamic Partisan Effects in Migration

This €1,000 prize is awarded annually for the best Paper given at the previous Joint Sessions. Nominees must have gained their PhD within the previous five years. The jury, chaired by Anna M. Sroka (University of Warsaw), also comprised Reuven Hazan (Hebrew University

of Jerusalem), Oddbjørn Knutsen (University of Oslo), Emiliano Grossman (SciencesPo LIEPP) and Maurizio Carbone (University of Glasgow).

Immigration is commonly considered a cross-cutting issue which divides mainstream parties internally. However, given the increased politicisation of the issue in electoral competition and the subsequent realignment of West European party systems, one would expect increasing partisan divides with more distinct policies between left- and right-wing governments.

Over the same time, economic globalisation and political internationalisation have increasingly limited the policy space for national governments. Philipp's Paper tests the politicisation and the globalisation hypothesis with a cabinet-based dataset of migration policy changes from 1980 to 2014 across 18 West European countries.

His results reveal the dynamic nature of partisanship, and confirm the realignment of migration policies with increasing divergence between left-wing and right-wing governments over time.

However, his results also show substantial variation between different dimensions of migration policy. In immigration policy, governments implemented more liberal policies over time,

independent of government ideology. In integration policy, the study finds significant polarisation over time.

Philipp's findings provide important insights into the dynamics of partisan effects and migration policy-making in times of globalisation.

Our Jury's verdict

'The theme of Philipp's Paper is topical, with broad relevance to the concerns of the discipline, and it makes an important contribution to existing scholarly literature on the dynamics of partisan influence in migration policy.

Philipp's Paper is focused, methodologically strong, and well written and constructed. His conclusions suggest a rich vein of research for future exploration.'

Ordinary Democracy: Reading Resistances to Debt after the Global Financial Crisis with Stanley Cavell's Ordinary Language Philosophy

ECPR awards an annual €1,000 prize for the best PhD thesis in politics, encompassing IR, Political Theory, and Public Administration. The winner is offered the chance to adapt their thesis for publication with ECPR Press.

The Blondel Prize jury was last year chaired by Birgit Sauer (University of Vienna). The jury also comprised Mary Farrell (Plymouth University), Petra Meier (University of Antwerp), and Ferdinand Müller-Rommel (Leuphana University Lüneburg).

Lauren's thesis, part of an Erasmus Mundus-funded PhD programme, examines resistances to debt in the UK and US, developing a novel account of democratic subjectivity in the context of international political economy. Lauren applies Stanley Cavell's ordinary language philosophy to show how 'ordinary democratic subjects' are opposing

debt-based economic citizenship. Her central argument is that debt's 'ordinary democrats' are reconstructing debt relations as a site of democratic selfhood and community in finance, so representing important practices of civic freedom.

The latest in our annual lecture series, established to honour the path-breaking work of one of the founding fathers of the discipline

The Great Recession that hit the world in 2008 was a critical juncture, nurturing socio-economic but also political transformations. Some of the political developments during the crisis challenged civil, political and social rights, triggering a Great Regression. Social inequalities have spiralled, with growing mistrust in established institutions triggering a sense of insecurity, and calls for exclusion.

The Great Recession had immediate and often dramatic political effects – especially on representative institutions. Party systems were particularly shaken, with the breakdown of mainstream parties and, in some cases, an unexpected rise of movement parties on the Left, and right-wing populist ones.

Direct forms of democracy and participatory innovations were fuelled by a growing malaise towards representative institutions. The crisis of institutional trust prompted calls for constitutional reforms that could help re-found the political community.

In sum, while political science research had pointed at the freezing of the traditional cleavages, the Great Recession brought about a de-freezing of all four lines of conflict that Stein Rokkan had analysed, as well as the emergence of new ones.

With reference to these transformations in social and political conflicts, the lecture will first address the political crises that were triggered by socio-economic transformations.

Multiple crises, sudden changes

In the second part of the lecture, the reflection will move to the challenge that sudden changes present to the existing analytical toolkit for the study of democracies.

Addressing mainly periods of stability, empirical theories of democracy have in fact traditionally studied institutional conditions for democratic governance. Constitutions have anchored functional and geographical divisions of power

and citizenship rights within nation states; political parties have been considered as the most important bi-frontal institutions in bridging the state and civic society; institutions of direct democracy have been considered as ways to complement delegation with some participation in specific (often limited) forms.

Empirical theories of democracy tended to stress continuities, looking at ways in which institutions structure behaviours, cleavages are frozen, political socialisation reproduces (or not) democratic values.

Not only constitutions, but also public policies have been considered as establishing path-dependent reproduction or, at best, gradual, incremental adaptation.

Recent evolutions have prompted instead an acceleration of constitutional processes, the emergence of new parties, and the multiplication of referendums. Times of multiple crises and sudden changes are under-structured times, in the sense that structures are no longer able to constrain events.

The concept of critical juncture, while quite stretched to cover a heterogeneous range of phenomena, will be revisited as a useful tool in understanding intense moments, such as the one we are living through, in which transformations happen quickly and in a cumulative fashion, as agency and conjectural developments seem able to break existing structures.
